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**Attention:** The letters *za* and *ra* denote *ḷ* and *ṛ*, respectively, of Tamil. Also note that *rra* sounds almost like *tra*, *rri* like *tri*, and so on. The consonant-cluster *nra* is pronounced somewhere between *nra* and *ndra*. It is, however, colloquially acceptable to pronounce the clusters *rra* and *nra* as *tta* and *nna*, respectively.
